- >Explore focus group or UX possibilities for library tool feedback, such as Primo or Haggerty Help Guides
- >Discuss involving faculty in database decisions
- >Look into developing a Student Advisory Board for the library

# OPTIMIZING LIBRARY COLLECTIONS

Continue with engaging, useful, and cost-effective library resources that anticipate user preferences and formats

- >Continue exploring streaming options
- >Update Collection Development practices in writing
- >Examine ILL workflow once new resource sharing partners are set
- >Re-evaluate EBSCO print journal subscriptions
- >Evaluate the future of Current Periodicals and Past Periodicals subscriptions and areas

>Explore Open Education Resources/Open Access textbook options and collaborate on university best practices

## TRANSFORMING SPACES AND INTERFACES

Cultivate user-centered, functional, and flexible library spaces and online tools, making them as welcoming and accessible as possible

- >Research grant possibilities for library furniture
- >Update library emergency plan
- >Examine accessibility issues for the library and recommend solutions, both building and online >Implement phase II of the library spaces plan, by evaluating TRC collection, measuring shelf space used from Fiction to Theses, and evaluating Reference section and measuring
- >Implement phase III of the library spaces plan
- >Implement phase IV of the library spaces plan

# PROGRESSIVE INFORMATION LITERACY

Develop critical policies and pedagogies to address current and future research and information literacy challenges

- >Replace the PARC Method with SIFT, and update LibGuides, presentations, and elsewhere accordingly
- >Create more Canvas modules, such as faculty library basics and discipline-specific modules

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# PROGRESSIVE INFORMATION LITERACY, CTD.

- >Formalize new instruction best practices, factoring in the Composition pilot, using the ACRL Framework for Information Literacy >Work toward short instructional videos and screen shots for reference, point of need, as well as distance education interactions >Develop instruction around multiple literacies, including Digital, Science, Privacy, Data and Ethics
- >Explore how to cover expanding technologies in instruction sessions and for faculty >Consider Universal Design for Learning (UDL) components for use with library tools and sessions

## INFORMATION MANAGEMENT

Collect and leverage library data to solidify service, space, and purchasing decisions; help guide students through today's complex information landscape

- >Evaluate where copyright currently stands with the CASE Act
- >Explore new methods to capture hourly patron counts
- >Consider adding a citation management tool such as Refworks, Proquest, or Zotero to meet the information management needs from our newly added doctoral/master programs.

>Assess chat service, LibGuides, and instruction >Develop new methods of feedback, such as usability testing for Primo, LibGuides, and any new home page

#### STAFFING AND WELLNESS

Achieve and maintain balance between personal and professional endeavors

- >Increase staff memberships and conference attendance opportunities
- >Increase staff collaborations
- >Increase staff social gatherings
- >Explore trauma-informed librarianship
- >Evaluate and update student worker onboarding and training
